Course Description:

"The joys and the hopes, the griefs and the anxieties of the (people) of this age, especially those who are poor or in any way afflicted, these too are the joys and hopes, the griefs and the anxieties of the followers of Christ. Indeed, nothing genuinely human fails to raise an echo in their hearts" (Gaudium et Spes #1). This course explores the body of literature known as Catholic Social Teaching as the voice of the Church raised to address social problems in the world. Often described as "the Church's best kept secret" the documents of Catholic Social Teaching offer insight into the profound revelation of God's justice demanding the dignity of persons who suffer injustice and the challenge to address injustice in social structures that threaten the mystery and dignity of persons and communities.

Course Objectives:

- The student will learn the theological vocabulary that articulates mystery and revelation through the dignity of persons and the potential of social structures
- The student will become familiar with the documents of Catholic Social Teaching and the methodology of the Church's social analysis
- The student will recognize critical questions that raise an awareness of the depth of the dignity of the human person, social structures that oppress human dignity, and the Church's response to such structures and critiques of the Church's response.
- The student will develop a framework for reflection and responding to current social structure that oppress human dignity and raise theological questions that can offer hope for transformation through justice and mercy.

Core Themes:

The documents of Catholic Social Teaching address the world and interconnections that exist in the most hopeful of challenges, as well as the most dire expressions of human misery caused by world events and practices. In this way "expanding world view" comes to the fore in this course. "Value and respect for self and others" is evident in the major themes of Catholic Social Teaching, primarily in the Church's consistent repetition and call for "the dignity of the person" and the participation of every member of the community in shaping the common good.

Assessment:

Assessment will be based on five primary categories: participation, quizzes, essay questions, presentations, and a major paper. Participating in the classroom discussion is expected from each student. The quizzes will check for understanding. The essay questions provide opportunity for the student to demonstrate completion of the reading assignment as well as provide opportunity for real-world application. The presentations will open the door for creativity in response to Catholic Social Teaching topics. The major paper will challenge the student to demonstrate understanding of the document as well as application of the material.
